In response to recent events in the USA which have highlighted racial injustice across the world, Christ Church East Greenwich reaffirms its commitment to Gospel values of diversity and inclusivity as expressed in the life and ministry of Jesus. We recognise that racism, born out of ignorance, prejudice and hatred, operates across all levels of society. We recognise the work that needs to be done to eliminate the incalculable hurt and suffering caused by systemic racism in our community, our country, and our world. As a diverse church family, we stand in solidarity with those who continue to be oppressed because of the colour of their skin. We affirm our commitment to listen, to learn, and to take action against racism in all its forms to show God's love and justice for all his people.

Starting Point...

Our statement above is only a starting point and we are committed to listening to one another so we can respond to the sharing of experiences through action. We think that listening and receiving experiences and stories is a starting point and hope that this would have a ripple effect which allow us to take action going forward to impact on our local community and more widely.

One response might be to hold a 'Sunday at Seven' event around lamenting and repenting as well as seeking reconciliation and restoration.

We will also be considering how we use the Bible during 'The Bible Course' as a call to freedom and understanding of God's love for all people and not as a weapon for oppression.

Royal Borough of Greenwich
